NEW POLICIES TO NOTE

1. Student Late Policy

Students should remain in school for the entire school day. Students arriving late to class miss valuable instruction as well as interfering in the learning of classmates. A conducive learning environment requires that students are prepared and arrive to class on time.

Late Procedures

1st late -verbal warning

2nd late - written warning and sms to parent

3rd late - parent contact by telephone or scheduled meeting

4th late - suspension

Note: further lates will result in an immediate suspension.

Also Note:

- The school gates will be locked at 8:15 am and students will be returned home unless the principal or educational supervisor receives and accepts a valid excuse. If a parent recognizes that the student will be late due an emergency, it should be conveyed in advance to the administrator.
- Student appointments should be scheduled after school hours.
- Parents are discouraged from requesting an early dismissal. Early dismissals will be permitted at the discretion of the stage administrator.

2. Student Computer Use in Middle and High School

Laptop/iPad device must contain a USB port for flash drives. Each student will receive a flash drive in September that has all textbooks downloaded. EBooks and supplemental online resources, such as the MOODLE online learning platform, will be used in the classroom each day. Hard copy textbooks will not be available. Failure to bring the device each day will have a negative impact on grades and learning

Technology has become an integral aspect of the learning process for all students. Students require the ability to research and have immediate access to information in order to complete the complex tasks required for the high school curriculum.

Thank you for your cooperation in ensuring that your child has the required technology. It is also important that your child has a lock and key to keep the device safe. No student should share a locker. Your child will be responsible to keep the device safely stored and used correctly. The school will not be responsible for any damage or theft.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

DAIS requires a minimum of 24 High School units of credit, taken over eight semesters in Grades 9 through to 12 inclusively to graduate.

The courses listed below are required to achieve graduation at the High School level. A credit is defined in adherence to Carnegie credit hour standards. The minimum requirement for graduation is a (C) average (2.00 GPA) overall.

*Any course taken beyond the number of units required in a given subject area is regarded as an elective in that subject area.



NOTIFICATION RE: Grade Point Average (GPA)

DAIS is altering its past practice of exclusion of art, music and PE from the GPA. Beginning September 2018, these three subjects will now be included in GPA calculations in Middle and High School. The rationale for the change is more students are seeking degrees in these subject areas.

Promotion Policy

Dover American International School's promotion policy is an integral component of its overall educational policy. In conjunction with achievement goals, it defines the levels of performance that permit students to move through the grade levels and graduate. Dover American International School believes that promotion from one grade to the next must indicate that students have passed a series of academically challenging courses and are prepared for the next grade. A student's promotion status is determined by academic performance and attendance.

Subject to any special considerations that might apply, the standards for promotion are listed below:

Elementary – Grades 3-5 Promotion Standards

To be promoted in grades three, four and five students must:

- Receive a passing grade of 63% (D) or above in the core subject areas (core subject areas are considered to be: English, Math, Science and Social Studies)
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Elementary Failure Notation

- Students who receive an "F" as a final grade in one or two of the cores subjects will not be allowed to be promoted to the next grade without successfully completing a summer school course in those subjects.
- Students who receive an "F" in more than two core subjects will not be promoted to the next grade level regardless of taking a summer school course.
- Students who receive an "F" as a final grade in an elective course have the option of completing a summer school course (if offered) or re-taking an exam in this subject.

Middle School – Grades 6-8 Promotion Standards

To be promoted in grades six, seven and eight students must:

- Receive a passing grade of 70% (C-) or above in the core subject areas (core subjects are considered to be: English, Math, Science and Social Studies)

Middle School Failure Notation

- Students who receive a “D+” as a final grade in one or two of the cores subjects will not be allowed to be promoted to the next grade without successfully completing a summer school course in those subjects.
- Students who receive a “D+” in more than two core subjects will not be promoted to the next grade level regardless of taking a summer school course.
- Students who receive a “F” as a final grade in an elective course have the option of completing a summer school course (if offered) or re-taking an exam in this subject.

High School – Grades 9-12 Promotion Standards

To be promoted in grades nine, ten, eleven and twelve students must:

- Receive a passing grade of 73% (C) or above in the core subject areas (core subjects are considered to be: English, Math, Science and Social Studies)

High School Failure Notation

- Students who receive a “C-“ or below as a final grade in one or two of the core subjects will not be allowed to be promoted to the next grade without successfully completing a summer school course in those subjects.
- Students who receive a “C-“ or below in more than two core subjects will not be promoted to the next grade level regardless of taking a summer school course.
- Students who receive an “F” as a final grade in an elective course have the option of completing a summer school course (if offered) or re-taking an exam in this subject.
- Students may qualify to take a subject final exam(s) after the summer course. If the student passes with a grade of “C” or higher, the student will be able to remain at Dover American International School, however, the highest possible re-take exam mark is a “C+”, and the student will be placed on academic probation.

It should be noted that universities have their special entrance requirements that usually include a SAT standard level of achievement.

Guiding Principle

Dover American International School strives to develop and maintain a safe, respectful and caring learning and work environment. This is achieved by addressing specific outcomes, promoting respect, civility, responsible citizenship and safety. Students and staff must comply with this policy to ensure that a safe and conducive learning environment exists within our school.

We promote mutual acceptance and recognize appropriate behaviors. Preventative strategies are employed to assist students in making sound personal decisions and deter inappropriate conduct. This is supported through the use of effective staff development programs, **student rewards and the implementation of a progressive discipline approach**. This uses a whole school approach that utilizes a continuum of interventions and strategies that promote positive behaviors. Examples of rewards may include, enhanced privileges, certificates and peer recognition. Examples of progressive discipline consequences may include: break detentions, removal from class, missing P.E., removal from competitions and school trips, in school suspension and out of school suspension. **It is important to note that the nature of the student conduct determines the placement on the continuum the supervisor or principal will apply.**

Intended outcomes:

- To foster a positive school experience for all students and teachers;
- Promote the safety of all people in our school;
- Ensure that all members of our school community are treated with respect and dignity;
- To create a supportive learning environment for all students with a focus on academic achievement and building healthy relationships;
- To promote, support and recognize positive student behavior;
- To address inappropriate behavior with corrective consequences applied within a framework of progressive discipline that are supportive in nature.

Examples of Behavior Expectations

The following should not be viewed as an inclusive list of behavior expectations. These are examples of how **progressive discipline** will be applied. It should be noted any behavior that does not represent the spirit and principle of the School can be addressed through a progressive discipline approach.

Behavior	Possible Consequences
<p>Tardiness Dover American International School administration and staff believe that regular and punctual school attendance is an essential component of a student's academic success. Attendance records are taken on a daily basis and checked for excessive tardiness and absences. To ensure that students understand the seriousness of regular attendance and punctuality, the late policy will be strictly enforced.</p> <p><i>Parents are discouraged from making appointments for students during school hours or requesting an early dismissal.</i></p> <p>Late Arrivals: Students are expected to be in school at 7:30 a.m. each morning since classes start at 7:40 a.m. Starting from 7:40 a.m., this will be considered a late arrival. The school gates will be closed to students at 8:15 am unless prior approval provided by the division administrator.</p> <p>Please Note: Every 5 late arrivals will be treated as one day absent.</p> <p>Absences:</p> <p>Excused Absence/Unexcused Absences It happens that sometimes an unexpected situation takes place and forces a student to miss a day or more from school. When will the school consider it as an excused or unexcused absence?</p>	<p><u>Late Procedures</u></p> <p>1st late-verbal warning</p> <p>2nd late - written warning and sms to parent</p> <p>3rd late- parent contact by telephone or scheduled meeting</p> <p>4th late - suspension</p> <p>Note: further late will result in an immediate suspension.</p> <p>*If a student is late during a Term Test or a Semester Exam, no extra time will be provided.</p> <p>What are the consequences for each case? These are the following cases when a student's absence will be considered as excused or unexcused with the following consequences: If a student is absent with an approved medical excuse from the school doctor and stage administrator, the student can take the average of the quizzes he/she had in case there are enough number of quizzes. The medical excuse should be submitted to the school administration on the returning day of the student. In case of any delay, the medical excuse will not be accepted and it will be treated as unexcused absence. In return, it should be noted that tardiness and absences will consequently affect the student's GPA and rank.</p> <p>If a student exceeds 18 days of unexcused absence, he/she must maintain a passing grade in the Semester Exam and achieve a minimum score of 80% in the Final Exam.</p> <p>If a student exceeds 31 days of unexcused absence, he/she will not be promoted to the next scholastic year.</p>
	<p>2. In case of any absence due to Championships and Sports tournaments, or medical reasons, a letter from the club or treating physician should be submitted to the school's stage administrator. Otherwise, the absence will not be accepted as the stage administrator has to be informed in advance.</p> <p>3. If a student is absent due to his Iqamaa (residency) renewal in any country, he/she will have to submit a copy</p>

of the visa, airline ticket, and the date of departure and arrival to the school's stage administrator **on the returning day of the student** and the stage administrator has to be informed in advance.

4. In case of absence due to Hajj, the procedures will be similar to the Iqamaa renewal.

5. If a first family member death takes place, a parent must inform the school with the student's absence.

6. All students must follow the school's calendar posted on the website. The school holds no responsibility towards any student who is travelling with parents during school days for Omrah trips, business trips, or touristic trips. Student's absence will be considered unexcused and grade deductions for all subjects will take place.

7. For Grades KG-5, students who miss more than 20 school days during a school year will be required to attend summer school. Parents will be responsible for any summer school expenses.

8. If a student is absent due to an embassy appointment, parents must notify the school and present the formal letter or email from the embassy stating the student's name and date of appointment. If the stage administrator does not receive this information, the absence will be considered an unexcused absence.

<p>Early Dismissal: No early dismissals are allowed during the school day unless the student is found to be sick and receives a note from the school's Doctor allowing him/her to leave.</p> <p>No Doctor's appointments during the school hours are allowed.</p> <p>If an acceptable family emergency matter takes place, parents, must contact the school in advance and the principal will decide on accepting or refusing the early dismissal.</p> <p>In case a parent is insisting on dismissing the student, the principal has the right to apply the unexcused absence policy on the student and grade deduction will take place.</p>	<p>Important Notes: Absences occurring on School Field Trips will be treated as Excused Absence.</p> <p>Days or other unusual days (such as the last day of a shortened school week or a shortened school day) will be treated as a typical unexcused absence. Deduction will take place for all subjects.</p> <p>All students, whether excused or unexcused, are still held responsible and accountable for completing their school work, homework, quizzes and tests, as well as collecting all their missing materials.</p> <p>No students are allowed to come to school driving their own vehicles or motorcycles, as this endangers theirs' and others' lives.</p> <p>An "Out of School Suspension" is considered an Excused Absence. Coursework will be graded to a maximum of 80%.</p>
<p>Homework Student achievement is the ultimate purpose for our school. Homework is a vital piece in the learning process. Not completing this assigned work has a direct impact on student success.</p>	<p>Homework and projects must be submitted by the due date. Delays will be counted as follows: 1st day: late assignments graded out of 80% 2nd day: late assignments graded out of 70% 3rd day: late assignments graded out of 60% After this no late assignments will be accepted and a grade of 0 will be given. Homework is graded upon correction, not submission. Quality work is expected of our students. If the homework is incorrect, the student will receive a corresponding grade.</p>

<p>Repeatedly breaking school rules and regulations: To ensure a positive and orderly environment, classroom rules are to be respected.</p> <p>Examples of class rules include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • No chewing of gum or eating of seeds during class time. • For the safety of all, the throwing of objects during class is prohibited. • No use of foul or disrespectful language. • No incidents of fighting, intimidation, threats, mistreatment, or any type of physical aggression. • No bullying a fellow mate. • No misbehaving inside the classroom, class disruption, or throwing objects in the air that could be hazardous. • No bringing of toys to school. • No disrespect towards the teachers. • No cutting off and interrupting classes. • All students are expected not to interfere with the learning of others. • Students will not leave the class without teacher permission. • 	<p>Repeated Offenses:</p> <p>If the student's behavior is persistent, parents will be immediately notified. Disciplinary actions will be progressive and might reach the point of issuing a probation letter. In severe cases, the school will consider home instruction.</p>
<p>Running in classroom or hallways For personal safety and the safety of others, all students are expected to walk when moving throughout the school. For personal safety, students are not to be in hallways or a locker area during non-designated times.</p>	<p>1st offense: verbal warning 2nd offense: break detention 3rd offense: discretion of supervisor or principal</p>
<p>Personal Items From Home For safety and the protection of personal property, students are not to bring personal items to school. Examples of these items include toys, laptops, roller blades, etc. Note: teachers may make exceptions if the items support instruction and student learning. Permission is granted ahead of time.</p>	<p>Items may be confiscated by the school administration and returned at the end of the day. Consequences at the discretion of the supervisor.</p>

<p>Cellphone/Electronic Devices (Grade 1 to Grade 8) To ensure a safe, uninterrupted learning environment, students are NOT to bring their cell phones to school.</p>	<p>Please note: The school will not be responsible for the loss of any cellphone. If students fail to comply with the rules, the following action will be taken: 1st offense: Phone is confiscated and returned the following day. 2nd offense: Phone is confiscated for a week with parent’s notification that this is the 2nd time and if happens for a 3rd time, confiscation will last the duration of a term, 4th time it will be returned by the end of the year.</p> <p>Parents have to sign this letter by the 2nd offense. If the student fails to return the signed notification, he/she will not get the phone back even after the duration of week is over.</p>
<p>High School Students – Rules for Cell Phones and Electronic Devices We strongly believe in role models, leaders, and teaching our students responsibilities that will prepare them for the future. They are permitted to keep their cell phones throughout the school day with the following conditions. Any breach to the rules will lead to consequences.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Cell phones are not to be seen used in Hallways. Cell phones are not to be seen used in class unless the teacher permits it. Apart from that, cell phones must be switched off or put on silent all the time and kept in student bag. • They will be collected by the teachers before any quiz or test. • Students must not use their cell phones to take videos or photos of any student or teacher on school premises. • Students will not be allowed to charge phones during class. • Cellphones/electronic devices are not to be kept for charging or storing in a class or an administration office unattended personally. • Laptops/IPads are to be used in class for educational purposes and upon teacher agreement. 	<p>If High School students fail to comply with the rules, the following action will be taken: 1st offense: Phone is confiscated and returned the following day. 2nd offense: Phone is confiscated for a week with parent’s notification that this is the 2nd time and if happens for a 3rd time, confiscation will last the duration of a term, 4th time it will be returned by the end of the year.</p> <p>Parents have to sign this letter by the 2nd offense. <p>Unauthorized Selling For the safety of all, students are not to sell unauthorized items at school.</p>	<p>1st offense: confiscate inventory and meet with parents. 2nd offense: progressive discipline is implemented by the supervisor.</p>

<p>Misbehavior Towards Teachers At all times, students and teachers will conduct themselves in a manner that treats others with respect and dignity.</p>	<p>Teacher to document incident. Supervisor to interview student and witnesses if required. Progressive discipline to be implemented.</p>
<p>Skipping Class To ensure uninterrupted learning and to meet all program expectations, students will not skip class.</p>	<p>1st offense: A week of break detention + parents notification. 2nd offense: to be determined by administration.</p>
<p>Safety Hazards It is prohibited to bring any material to school that could act as a safety hazard to the health and well-being of others. Fireworks are prohibited.</p>	<p>Disciplinary consequences at the discretion of the supervisor.</p>
<p>Academic Dishonesty High achievement will be nurtured and celebrated in the school. This achievement will be completed using a high degree of integrity. Any form of academic dishonesty will not be tolerated. It should be noted that all students should be familiar with the academic dishonesty policy. Plagiarism, the act of presenting another's work for ideas as your own. It is considered as an act of cheating and will be graded as a 0%.</p>	<p>1st offense: 0% given to the assignment. 2nd offense: parent notification and 0% given to the assignment. Plagiarism will be treated exactly in the same manner as cheating.</p>
<p>Vandalism/Defacing Property To ensure a safe, inviting and useful physical learning environment, vandalism and the defacing of property will not be tolerated.</p>	<p>Financial restitution to be made for property damaged. Progressive discipline may be applied. Actions may include suspension or expulsion from the school.</p>
<p>Possession, Use or Distribution of a Controlled Substance (Tobacco) In adherence of law, the distribution or use of tobacco and other controlled substances is not allowed.</p>	<p>1st offense: out of school for two days. 2nd offense: to be determined by administration.</p>
<p>Possession of a Weapon (Includes but is not Limited to a Knife, Pocket Knife, or Chain) Safety is a number one priority for the school community. The school has adopted zero tolerance for anyone who brings a potential weapon to school. This includes items such as knives and chains.</p>	<p>Progressive discipline to be implemented at discretion of supervisor and principal. Actions to include: Confiscate weapon. Out of school suspension and parent meeting. Student to be removed from school until a decision is made by school directors.</p>
<p>Theft All students should demonstrate respect for the possessions of others.</p>	<p>Progressive discipline to be implemented at the discretion of supervisor and principal. Actions to include: Out of school suspension and parent meeting. Student to be removed from the school until a decision is made by school directors.</p>

Students who wish to clarify a situation with a staff member have an obligation to do so privately after class, after school or during break. Students may not disrupt class to settle differences of opinion, question consequences or a teacher's authority.

Mitigating Factors: Mitigating Factors may be considered when deciding on appropriate discipline e.g. age of student, cognitive ability of the student etc.

Uniform Policy

All Dover American International School students are required to wear the school's uniform. Uniform must be well maintained at all times. Students' personal appearance in school demonstrates their seriousness about their education and themselves. Due to this fact, students should be wearing a full, clean and ironed uniform **EVERY DAY**. Other aspects of their appearances (hair styles, accessories, etc.) should also be appropriate to an academic setting. Students with special sizes that cannot be found in the store, have to make a special order from the store at least a month before school starts. In this case, a signed letter from the store stating that the student's size is unavailable must be submitted to the school's principal, along with the time of receiving the altered uniform. Breaking the dress code of the school will result in disciplinary action, including possibly being sent home to change your clothes.

Please note the following guidelines:

- For boys, hair should be always trimmed and combed, long hair is unaccepted in school as well. If the hair is too long, he will not be allowed to come to school until he gets a proper haircut. These absences will be counted as excused absence and course grades will be deducted.
- Shaved or trimmed beards and moustache is a must.
- Suitable colored scarves are allowed for veiled ladies.
- Long sleeve T-shirts under short ones are allowed (Only white/Navy blue).
- No tight or slim pants. Students are not to change the cut or the style of the school pants. Students changing the style or cut of trousers will be considered as an out of school uniform and will be asked to purchase another pair of pants with the school design. A note must be sent to the principal if the student is not wearing the school's pants due to any incident or reason.
- Only the school jacket is allowed to be used for cold weather. No other jackets or color may be worn. If a student wears other jackets, the jackets will be taken and confiscated till the end of the year.
- Seniors may wear their special approved Senior Shirt.
- No slippers, open toe shoes or crocs are allowed in school. Students seem with them will be sent home immediately.
- Ice-Caps, caps and jacket hoods are not allowed inside the classes and school building.
- Only small stud earrings for ladies.
- No dark or bright colored nail polish (natural colors only are allowed), makeup or accessories is not allowed during the school hours.
- Students who come to school with out of uniform, will not be allowed to attend the day. They will be sent home, or parents can provide them with the proper uniform before the beginning of the second class at 8:30 am.

For Girls wearing dark or bright colored nail polish or make up, the consequences will be progressive and may include the following:

1st offense: She will receive a verbal warning and remove the nail polish, or the makeup.

2nd offense: A written warning will be issued and a parent communication will take place, as well as a removal of the nail polish or makeup.

If the student's behavior is persistent, further disciplinary actions will be taken according to the principal's discretion.

For students who do not come to school in the described school uniform:

1st offense: Student will receive a verbal warning.

2nd offense: A written warning will be issued and a parent communication will take place. If the student's behavior is persistent, further disciplinary actions will be taken according to the principal's discretion.

Transportation Policy

School Transportation:

Transportation to and from school is an important part of the day. All rules and regulations of the school also apply to the bus. The rules stipulated, although may be deemed as common sense, must be obeyed at all times in order to ensure the safety and well-being of our children.

- Students must wait on buses outside their homes at least 5 minutes before the bus arrival, as buses should not wait for students for this causes a delay in the bus arrival to school.
- Students cannot stand, open doors, or exit the bus while moving. Such actions endanger the student's safety.
- Talking to or distracting the bus driver is prohibited. All students' music players or talking must be kept to the minimum.
- Students are to follow the matron's instructions all the time. Otherwise disciplinary action will be taken by the school administration.
- Littering or throwing objects in or out of the bus is prohibited. If such behavior takes place, consequences will be severe.
- Students must not stick their arms and/or heads outside the windows as injuries and accidents can take place.
- Students are not allowed to leave in their private cars **or use another bus** without prior parental consent **in the form of a written letter** submitted to the school administration signed by them **maximum first thing in the morning of that day**. This ensures students' safety. **A phone call will be made by the school administration to the parent in order to confirm on the matter.**
- Students are required to report to their buses directly at the end of the school day after the final bell rings. The bus will not wait for anyone. If a student misses the bus, transportation home will be his/her responsibility as such behavior causes a delay to the bus dismissal time. If this behavior is persistent, the bus will not pick up the student the next morning.
- In case of problems occurring on the bus with the bus driver, matron or students, the matron will report the incident to the school's principal and the Transportation supervisor so that the necessary action can be taken.

- In case of school closure due to bad weather or dangerous conditions, the buses will not be operating at all. If parents have any concerns, they may contact the bus matron or the school administration.

Students are expected to behave in a respectful manner at all times. Inappropriate behavior on buses will not be tolerated and actions will be taken accordingly:

1st offense: A verbal warning will be given and a parent communication will take place.

2nd offense: The student will receive a written warning to be signed by parents.

If a student is still failing to comply and follow instructions, he/she will be receiving penalties of bus suspension that might progress to the point of banning him/her from using the bus till the end of the year.

Private Transportation:

Students who walk back home, or students who use private means of transportation such as Uber/private drivers/friends....etc. Parents are requested to sign on the consent and send it back to school stating which mean of transportation their child(ren) will use. School will not be held responsible for these means of transportation.

Physical Education (P.E.) Policy

- The P.E. uniform must be worn by all students scheduled to have P.E.
- Students not in uniform will lose grades, and will not be permitted to attend the class.
- Active participation is required by all students.
- All students must keep the courtyard and gym always clean. No littering or cutting flowers are allowed. Students must clean the tables after eating their lunch.
- Usage of balls and tools must be under the P.E. teacher's supervision.
- Any equipment in the gym must be dealt with carefully and under supervision.

Science Lab Policy

- Due to the sensitivity of the lab, all students must not enter the lab without their teacher's permission.
- Upon entering the lab, students must walk slowly and quietly. This behavior is expected throughout the duration of the class.
- If the student damages any of the school's lab equipment, they are responsible to have it replaced.
- Students are responsible for cleaning their equipment and putting it away, as well as tidying their work area after use as instructed by the teacher.
- No food or drinks are allowed in the lab at any time.
- No school bags are allowed in the lab. Students must bring only the necessary books, notebooks and pencil case inside the lab.
- Students must not touch any lab equipment until instructed to do so.
- For safety reasons, it is essential that students follow the explicit instructions regarding each experiment. Any action determined by the teacher to be of a hazardous nature might lead to suspension from the lab class.

- Food or drinks are not allowed in the computer lab.
- Book bags should be left outside the computer lab.
- Students are not allowed to change any computer display settings without teacher permission.
- Each student is responsible for his/her assigned computer. Report any problems to the teacher immediately.
- Due to the sensitivity of the lab, all students must not enter the lab without the teacher's permission.
- Any damage to the school's property will be replaced by the student.
- Students are to follow the teacher's instruction.

Library Policy

The library is a wonderful resource for all students. All students are expected to cherish it and keep it always well preserved.

- Politely ask the librarian for help if you cannot find a book.
- Return books on time.
- Take good care of the books you have borrowed. Students will be billed in full for any lost or damaged books.
- Before the end of the library lessons, return books to their proper places or give the books to the librarian to be shelved.
- Do not leave books on tables, and books are never to be placed on the floor.
- Chairs should be put in their proper place.
- Student voices must not rise significantly above a whisper in the library.
- Food and beverages are not permitted in the library.

Cafeteria Policy

All students must comply with the cafeteria rules. These rules are very simple to follow:

- Students are expected to respect each other's turn in the buying queue.
- No pushing or cutting in line is allowed.
- Students are to purchase their lunch during break time only unless he/she has a note from the stage administrator.
- No student is to order food by the end of the break as by doing this they get late to their class and such late arrivals to classes lead to grade deduction.

Locker Policy

Lockers are expected to be used in an orderly and organized fashion. In order to do so, all students are required to follow these rules:

- No sharing lockers is allowed.
- Locker usage will be only during the 5 minutes transition between classes when the bell rings.
- Since students must be always ready and well prepared for their classes, all the needed materials must be taken from the locker before class. Students will not be permitted to leave the class for the lockers, as this will lead to losing grades from the subject.
- All the lockers must be kept closed and locked at all times.

The following procedures will be implemented if lockers are left open:

1st offense – verbal warning

2nd offense – 2 days suspension of locker privileges

3rd offense – a week suspension of privileges

4th offense – a term suspension of locker privileges

5th offense – loss of all locker privileges for the remainder of the year

- All the lockers must be well organized and clean.
- Any vandalism of lockers will be paid for by the student involved.

NOTE: No writing on the lockers or walls is allowed. Students will have to clean them or pay for repairing or replacement.
