
Volunteers during Ministry Exams (Jan 29 / 30)

DAIS High School Student Council

What is a Student Council?

School Planning and Supporting Committee's

The purpose of the School Improvement Plan is to ensure all school stakeholders are regularly engaged in a <u>cycle of continuous improvement</u>. This cycle is based on regular reflection and decisions that are informed by relevant data. It ensures daily activities are not distracted from our core work - to increase student achievement and measure our performance based on student success.

Data Informed Decision Making

DAIS believes in data informed decision making. The school embraces <u>Victoria Bernhardt's</u> four areas for collecting data to inform decision making.

Outcome Data – student performance data, gathered from the classroom and standardized assessments. Examples include term testing, semester exams, project work, classroom work, homework as well as MAP and SAT testing.

Process Data – gathering information related to the effectiveness of teaching techniques, classroom supports and programs. Examples include Marzano's instructional strategies, the proper use of exemplars, assessment rubrics and various computer programs.

Demographic Data – this is data collected on individual groups, such as boys vs. girls' performance, the effects of second language, special needs students and students coming from different regions of Africa and the world. This information is gathered through the school's Ren-Web system where various groupings can be isolated and examined.

Perception Data – this is information that is measured through survey, individual and groups discussion. Examples of this information are the results taken from parent, student and staff surveys (*Stop, Start, Continue telephone interviews*). It provides a good measure on school climate and the perceived effectiveness of the school from the various stakeholders who compose the school community.

Applying the Stages of Implementation - Monitoring of the introduction of new initiatives and practices.

A new initiative / practice may be introduced to the school through a recognized need that is determined through gaps noted in achievement outcome data (example – MAP data – introduction of IXL), or through outcome, demographic and process data (example – Facilities Review supporting facilities expansion to increased services for our special needs population and the accommodation of new program). It should be noted that each new initiative is monitored through a scaffolding of events leading to a consolidation stage consisting of a monitoring and review. During this final stage the initiative is assessed concerning impact and intended outcome. Each implementation plan has a lead who monitors the execution and review of the plan. Leads are supported by committees composed of staff who are directly impacted by the new program / initiative.

Monitoring and Review of Stages of Implementation

Over the past several years the school has been involved in a number of initiatives to improve service to the community it serves. Each initiative is put through a series of stages of implementation. Each initiative is regularly measured for the impact it is having on the school as well as how quickly it is becoming an embedded practice into our daily work. Each initiative is monitored by a committee of staff members and progress is regularly reported to the schools administration. Currently the school has fourteen different committees. The stages of implementation are as follows:

Study Stage - Awareness

Study Phase – current practice is still evident

Review - Gathering information and data

Observing and comparing current practice vs. new proposed practice

Identifying and developing professional development plans Planning for implementation is taking place

Implementation Stage - Beginning

Current practice is still the dominant model, new practice is slowly implemented at targeted areas and reviewed Professional learning is applied across all targeted stakeholders Planning for partial implementation is taking place

Implementation Stage - Partial

New practice is eclipsing current practice

Further professional development is targeted based on group and individual needs

Beginning to coordinate strategies with other initiatives Planning for full implementation is taking place

Implementation Stage- Full

New practice is being fully implemented in all target areas All supplies and support material are in place and used regularly Stakeholder conversation demonstrates a full understanding of the practice / initiative

Consolidation Stage

Consistent application of the initiative in all targeted area, monitoring and review of the practice / initiative is taking place

Stages of Implementation Committee Updates

Each newsletter will provide updates concerning the stages of implementation committees. Not all committees will have reports at the time of publishing the newsletter. Committees who have provided updates to the administrative team, will have summaries shared in the upcoming newsletter. For this issue there are five committees reporting on their work.

Purpose & Direction- The school is in *consolidation stage* of the Purpose and Direction. All teachers embed the Purpose & Direction in their planning. Teachers' plans are regularly checked and documentation is collected in the form of samples of projects and videos. The evidences demonstrates that community has a sound understanding of the broad outcomes that DAIS has targeted for its students.


Review of Universities Partnerships - The purpose of this committee is to develop deeper partnerships with the main universities that our students attend. Tracking of student academic performance after they graduate from DAIS helps provide data that assists in strengthening the current program being provided at the school. Currently, this committee is at the partial implementation stage of its work. Discussions with the Canadian University is taking place to examine how students can be tracked without interfering with confidential issues. The discussions have also included providing special fee discounts for DAIS students. In addition, discussions are also taking place with Sir Wilfrid Laurier University in Waterloo, Ontario, Canada concerning professional development for staff and student admissions.

Stages of Implementation Updates—Continued

IXL - IXL current status is *implementation stage—full*. It is a program that is directly linked to our MAP testing that takes place twice a year. The program takes individual information provided by MAP results and drills areas requiring review. IXL was introduced to our school community in 2019 to support our elementary students. This program has been expanded to include middle school students. The committee monitoring this program has received positive reviews from parents concerning the use of IXL. One common caution from parents has been "care should be taken not to over use the program".

Facilities— Currently this committee is in *the 'beginning stage of implementation'*. DAIS has a seven year plan to accommodate projected student and program growth. Over the past year the school has replaced the surface of the internal courtyard. Eight new classrooms have been introduced along with a renewed cafeteria area. Large sun umbrellas have been added to the school to increase protection from the weather elements. Renovations and new construction is also taking place on the roof of the building to further enhance the services provided by the Dover Student Development Centre.

Gifted Programing—This program is targeted to be introduced to DAIS



in September of 2022. The committee is at the *Study Stage*—

Awareness and is gathering information concerning the best program to fit the needs of DAIS. The Renzulli program for gifted and talented students is the structure of study that poses the greatest interest. It is a program that provides both in-class and out of class study opportunities. The program also provides enrichment activities for those who may not want or need a full 'gifted program' but can benefit from enrichment.

Peer Coaching— Peer coaching is a confidential process through which two or more colleagues work together to reflect on current practices; expand, refine, and build new skills; share ideas; teach one another; conduct classroom research; or solve problems in the workplace (Robbins,1991). This initiative is at the *stage of full implementation it should be noted that* all educational staff participate in the program. Teachers must participate in a peer exchange twice through the year and this obligation has become part of their professional evaluation. These exchanges involve classroom visitation as well as completing online research. The core purpose of this activity is to improve student outcomes.

PAIS values parent input. We v

DAIS values parent input. We view parents as partners in the education of the child. Input is regularly received through the 'Stop, Start, Continue' telephone surveys that take place (every second week each division of the school calls a group of three to five parents to receive random feedback on the schools progress in serving our students). This ongoing parental feedback has been critical in helping the school improve service concerning IXL, the assigning of homework as well as online teaching and learning. We are also most grateful for having a very dedicated parent advisory committee. These monthly meetings have provided excellent feedback to the school concerning planning issues and daily operations

In an effort to increase our parent voice we are asking for parent representation on five of the noted Stages of Implementation Committees.
